DESCRIPTION AND LOCATION

St. John's Northwestern Academies is an independent, coed, college preparatory and leadership development boarding and day school for grades 7-12, located in Delafield, Wisconsin, 25 miles west of Milwaukee and 95 miles northwest of Chicago. The 110-acre campus includes several buildings that house classrooms, learning commons, residence halls, dining hall, chapel, infirmary, student center, gym, and pool, along with athletic fields and a nine-hole golf course. Annual enrollment is approximately 180 students from across the United States and numerous international countries.

EXTRACURRICULAR

All students participate in a leadership program and athletics during the school year. Club opportunities are available throughout the year. Community service and civic engagement activities are an important part of student life.

MIDDLE SCHOOL GRADES 7-8

Seventh and eighth grade students study English, mathematics, science, social studies, physical education and an elective in fine arts and technology. Qualified eighth graders may take electives in world language or freshman-level course work for high school credit.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADES 9-12

Graduation requires a minimum of 23 academic credits: 4 of English, 3 of math, 3 of social studies, 3 of science, 2 of world language, 1 of technology, 1 of fine art, 1.5 of physical education, and at least 1.0 of leadership.

Honors Program. Honors, AP, and college level courses are available in most core disciplines.

English as a Second Language (ESL): ESL courses are offered from beginning to advanced levels for international students needing ESL support. Most students in the ESL program are also integrated into some mainstream classes.
